Haiku and Collage

Participants will walk away with a work-in-progress, building on how to establish a haiku practice and then moving into keeping a workbook/journal that can include writing/sketching/collage.

Session 1: Haiku overview and how to use the newspaper to spot and create #HabitualHaiku. We'll create some haiku from newspaper. The instructor team will discuss their collaborative (award-winning) process and give some tips on what to buy, what to bring to create collages from haiku that will be written. Session 2: Hands-on sharing and haiku collage creation.

Bringing New Life to Old Jewelry

In this 5-session class we will be turning old and extra jewelry into new pieces that can be re-adorned to our liking. We will also be experimenting with found objects that are not necessarily "jewelry supply"; such as hardware bits, coins, shells, and almost anything else you can think of. We will be starting the class off with basic wire-wrapping skills that will help you to reinvent old pendants, single earrings, snapped chains, etc. and make them anew. As the class continues, participants will be bringing in their own old pieces that they would like to re-design and other items they would like to incorporate. We will be working on earrings, necklaces, bracelets, and more -- and learning different skills involving wire, elastic, beading wire, and jewelry making tools. Everyone will go home with a new collection combining old pieces and new parts!

LIZ RUBEL has done production work for over 5 unique jewelry designers in New York City and has made pieces for stores and boutiques across the world. She loves sharing her ideas and especially loves learning how others involve creativity, art, and design in their everyday lives and work. She believes in the importance of art to heal and to relate to one another in this crazy world. Uncial Calligraphy and Decorative Gold Leaf

Uncial is one of the main calligraphy fonts that calligraphers must know. Because it has no capitals Uncial fits nicely into corners and tight spaces and compliments foundational and italic fonts. We will start by learning uncials and then move on to two modern fonts (Akim Cursive and Peter Thornton's capitals) that are fun on their own and can be mixed with the essential alphabets. Easy to learn and very versatile.

In addition, we will learn to apply gold leaf for accents and decoration to make bookmarks, cards and broadsides. Challenging but very rewarding!

Narrative Puppetry and Performance

Tap into one of our most primal - and playful - forms of storytelling in this Narrative Puppetry workshop. For over 4,000 years, humans have used puppets not only for entertainment, but for the performance and preservation of myth; become a part of this tradition by bringing to life one of your own myths (a favorite memory, perhaps, or family legend) using homemade puppets, props, and scenery. Participants will be gently guided through various techniques in the creation of hand, rod, and shadow puppets as they explore the medium. By the end of the class, everyone will have created and performed their own unique piece of theater- no previous experience necessary!

ALEXIA ANTONIOU is a playwright, musician, and illustrator who believes that the desire to tell a story- through any medium- is one of our most unifying traits as humans, an ancestral drive as essential to our species' identity as toolmaking or language. In her work as an instructor of the arts, her goal has been to help empower even those who might not think of themselves as "artists" to hold up a lantern to the magnificent worlds living within them- to find the stories that only they can tell. Shibori Dye Techniques

Shibori comes from the Japanese verb root shiboru, "to wring, squeeze, press." In this workshop, students will learn about the technique of Shibori, the technique of placing resists on fabric to create a pattern using an Indigo Dye. Students will learn three different styles of Shibori, and explore with the tools and material to make a unique design. Within the class, we will discuss learning through experimentation, exploration, and process-based ways of creating art.



KATHRYN SCLAVI has taught Shibori dyeing at the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archeology and Anthropology every year for the past several years, at Flux Factory in Queens, and as a Professional Development for educators ranging from Pre-K to High School.

Log Cabin Knitting

The Creative Center will supply needles.
