Take your cellphone photography to the next level. We will explore fine art photography captured on smartphones. You'll learn how to control your phone's camera and to improve photographic skills as we focus on capturing images of texture, geometry, minimalism, color vs. B&W, silhouettes and point of view.

BARBARA LEE's evocative work has evolved over time. She was a children's portrait photographer, specializing in B&W candid, fine art images when she was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2005. Her photography underwent a profound transformation, echoing her life. Mobility issues post-treatment led her to sit down and see beauty where she had never seen it before; life no longer needed to be in focus in order to be beautiful. Her photography became abstract and full of motion. She started her career shooting film and eased into digital along with everyone else but her creativity exploded when she got an iPhone. Camera apps on her cell phone allow her to be creative in ways that she is unable to replicate with her DSLR. Ink It Up is a playful take on gyotaku, a Japanese form of printing from the 1800's. The form reimagines everyday objects as stamps that when 'inked up' provide a transfer of their shape and texture. "The traditional Japanese method of printing fish came about before the advent of photography, when fishermen were looking for a way to record the size and species of their catch." They would ink up their catch with octopus ink and press rice paper on top to create the image. Learn to apply the beauty of the natural world to your work with this printing technique.



Lynne Pidel graduated with a BFA in Video and Printmaking at the School of Art and Design at Alfred University in 1999. She has shown her work in the USA and India. She became a Yoga teacher in India through Integral Yoga Institute in 2009 and is known at the Institute, where she is a senior teacher, as Lakshmi (a name given to her in India). 

Acrylic Pour/Flow Painting Thursday October 25th 10am-3pm

Pour/flow painting is an innovative way to use acrylic paints to create an art piece. Paint isn't applied with a brush or palette knife, but is loosely poured, suspended in a flowable medium and gravity moves the paint across the surface of the canvas. The results are unlike anything you can get with a brush: fluid flows of paint without any brush marks or texture. Learn ways in which this exciting technique can smooth out unwanted texture, create marbleized effects, rich colored glazes and add some fun to your painting process!

DESI MINCHILLO is both architect and artist. An architect for 23 years, her projects have involved civic structures such as courthouses and schools. In 2006, she changed her focus and embarked in the art world. Her artistic style, although influenced by architectural imagery and theory, focuses on the fragility of life. Her past work has involved the use of found materials to create temporal sculptural reliefs. She has applied her past artistic investigation to her current paintings. She has participated in numerous shows and has been awarded grants from the QCA, LBI foundation and the SCA percent for arts program. She has taught workshops as a visiting artist at the LBI foundation, the middle village school and creative center. She is a Creative Center Hospital Artist-In-Residence for at Mount Sinai West and has also worked at Bellevue Hospita and Mount Sinai Hospital.

Participants will be introduced to construction and attachment strategies in order to start and complete painting-based assemblage projects. Projects will be based in painting and combined with different assemblage techniques including attaching found objects with hardware and archival adhesives. Students will be encouraged to find relationships between found objects and painted supports. Examples include artists Kurt Schwitters, Betty Parsons, and Robert Rauschenberg.

Printmaking: Collograph Relief Printing

Class Location: University Settlement, 184 Eldridge Street, Art Room

In this course, we will explore the world of printmaking through a process called "collography" which is a relief-printing process. In this course we will be attaching shapes, fibers, texture mediums, etc., to a piece of wood or cardboard to create a layered "plate" and then using inks and handprinting techniques to make multiple prints. Students will get to try varyious materials, and inks and have the opportunity to make a suite of prints.

CHERYL PASWATER holds her MFA in Painting and Masters in Art History from the Pratt Institute. Her work is largely comprised of paintings, prints, works on paper, as well as works in book making, sculpture, projections, and installation art. Cheryl has exhibited her artwork at various galleries including the Pratt Institute, Artists Space, Cannonball Press, St. Josephs College, the Harrison Center for the Arts, IPCNY, Nurture Art, The Painting Center, and the Indianapolis Museum of Contemporary Art. As well having worked on collaborations with Loteria and having installations in Upstate New York and Brooklyn, NY.
