Nature-Inspired Weaving

Bennie Krause of INTERTWINE ARTS VIRTUAL on ZOOM Fridays, May 3, 10, 17 & 24 (4 Sessions) 1:00 - 3:00 PM EST

Description: Take advantage of the warm season and get inspired by the outdoors as we depict it through weaving! In this workshop series, participants will learn how to prepare a loom using simple materials and will be guided through creating woven pieces inspired by the natural shapes we see in the spring and summer. These weaving sessions are designed to be accessible for all, to allow anyone to develop their own unique artistic aesthetic, and to show that there is no such thing as making a mistake. We will weave together in a relaxed and communal atmosphere, and everyone will walk away with at least one finished piece of woven art.

Materials: A variety of yarns, pieces of cardboard, scissors. Optional: A small tapestry needle, tape, stick glue, found objects such as ribbons, fabric scraps, sticks, flowers, candy wrappers, etc.

Bennie Krause is a Seattle-born artist and poet currently residing in Maryland. An Alumni of Maryland Institute College of Art, they graduated in 2018 with BFA in Fibers. Working primarily with tactile processes of making, such as dyework, felting, and embroidery, Bennie Krause's pieces often utilize the meeting of poetics and the human form. Informed by their identity as a disabled and LGBT person, much of their work is tinged with themes of nostalgia or longing, and explores the complicated nature of intimacy, desire, and bodily relationships. Currently, Bennie Krause is working as a teaching artist for Intertwine Arts, a New York Nonprofit founded to teach and share weaving with disabled communities.

Thursday May 9 - 10 AM to 1 PM: Bird Perched on a Lotus Petal: Shades of yellow, orange, fuchsia and green are layered to create drama. Tiny brushstrokes added, when the lotus blossom and leaves are dry, create veins and texture. Painting details, to form the feather pattern of a beautiful bird, will be demonstrated.

Thursday May 16- 10 AM to 1 PM: Persimmons: These beautiful fruits have glowing bright colors from soft yellows to deep orange. The skins are smooth and shiny so participants will start with wet on wet leaving areas for highlight. Overlapping the fruit will establish spatial relationships and an interesting composition. If time allows, patterns can be painted as wallpaper and or a table covering.

Materials will be provided.

MARIKA HAHN is a former TCC Hospital Artist-In-Residence at Bellevue Hospital. When a patient told Marika they were not creative, she asked them to give her a few minutes of their time. Once the brush was in their hand, color got dropped onto a wet paper and flows and blends into other colors. Says Marika, "Patients are amazed. Everyone smiles!" Her own artwork is inspired by nature and wildlife even though NYC is her home. Exploring color, shapes and brush strokes with people who have never before held a paint brush inspires Marika to further her work.
